



Remember This!

Among declarative, interrogative,

imperative, and exclamatory

sentences, an interrogative

sentence asks a yes or no question

or requests information. This

is different from a statement,

which tells us something or gives

information. Interrogative sentences

require an immediate answer.

The typical structure of an interrogative sentence for yes or no questions is:

Auxiliary verb (do)	Subject	Main verb	Rest of sentence
Do Did	you he	+ speak come	English? last night?

The typical structure of an interrogative sentence for information questions using *WH-question word (what, who, where, when, why, how)*, is:



CHECKING UNDERSTANDING

When we are having a conversation with someone, we always want to make sure that they understand. Should someone ask if you understand what he/she is saying, respond honestly; if you need to ask something, do so right away.




What does this mean?
